Payment Application Software Cost-Benefits

Payment applications are documents that provide details on labor, materials, change orders, and other construction project specifics. Essentially, it's a request for payment with supporting documents and pictures. Common support material in applications for payment include:

- Payment Application Form
- Schedule of Values
- Change Orders
- Lien Waivers
- Project Status & Receipts
- Visual Documentation

Even though reviewing payment applications is slow and complex, research shows that fewer than 1 in 3 general contractors use software to organize, send, and track payments and paperwork. I recently spoke with a few customers to see how much time they really spend per payment application. General contractors spent...

- about 10 minutes gathering the required documents (AFP, lien waiver, backups)
- about 15 minutes reviewing progress by project team
- about 5 minutes entering the invoices into ERP
- about 5 minutes ensuring compliance requirements have been met
- about 5 minutes preparing required lien waivers post-payment and collect from the sub

ARE YOU AT RISK

Citizen Crusader Carillon

In the fall of 1993, the Cincinnatus Association presented to the Greater Cincinnati community the Citizen Crusader Carillon, which was placed at the east end of Sawyer Point, the spot of the original settlement of Losantiville that was later renamed Cincinnati, after the Society of the Cincinnati who were inspired by the Roman farmer, soldier, and model citizen Cincinnatus. The purpose of the carillon was to provide a monument to volunteerism in Cincinnati. In recent years, the bells went silent and required refurbishing. A special fund at the Greater Cincinnati Foundation, set up to support the carillon financed that work as well as follow- up work led by our member John Simpkinson to expand the "concert" capacity of the bells.
